Objectives

This course is designed to give a broad overview of the entire field of theatre arts. It will include studying and theory of the following: playwriting, acting directing, set, costume, and lighting design, play structure, criticism, theatre architecture, producing and a brief historical survey. Field trips to theatrical productions, group assignments, and a creative project will give students and experiential understanding of the art form. Because of the interactive nature of this course, I will go through the first two chapters thoroughly and the remaining five will be on your own. There will be a chapter exam every other week, total of seven. We will be working in class simultaneously on live projects as you read the chapters at home. We will read a play out loud, which I will supply to you. For the midterm you are to perform a monologue that I will select for you in costume for a live audience. During the latter half of this semester, you will be put into groups (your own theatre company) and will produce, write, direct, design and perform a final 10 min play which you control from beginning to end for a live theatre audience (each student can invite up to 2 guests; 1 mandatory). The Final Paper Exam will be a timed test with exact questions from the previous seven Chapter tests. You will keep each test, attached to the scantrons and return the day of the Paper Final.

Course Outcomes: Student Learning Outcomes: SLO

Students will exit this course with knowledge and insight into the theatrical processes which will help them analyze, evaluate and articulate responses to works of theatre artists, develop an appreciation for the guiding principles that govern theatrical art, demonstrate knowledge of the theatre's relationship to life, art, performance, and its role in society and culture. They will become informed audience members and let theatre enrich their lives.

Policies

Attendance

I expect students to be on time, to be fully prepared participants who are active learners. If you are late and miss roll call, it is your responsibility to see me after class, on that day to be counted in attendance. Three tardies equal one absence. Three unexcused absences will drop your grade one full letter.

Late Assignments

Any assignment or project submitted late will have point value reduced by 50% before grading. If you know you are going to be absent on the day the assignment or test is due, turn it in early. There will be no make-up test.

Extra Credit

Extra credit will be available; it is equivalent to the Play Reviews, however the value is equal to 1pt rather than 3 1/2pts.

Academic dishonesty will not be tolerated and will be dealt with according To school policies.

Play Attendance

You must attend two professional plays and write a two-page critique, typed, font 12, double-space paper on each performance. Program and ticket must be stapled to the package.
