Welcome

This semester, you will be introduced to the general field of oceanography, including principals of earth science, plate tectonics, earth internal structures, study and features of the sea floor, the chemical and physical properties of sea water, currents, tides, waves and their effects on marine organisms, and life in the ocean. Special reference will be made to the Southern California environment and the problems of people and the sea.

Course Description:

Oceanography 001 (Oceano 001) is intended to provide students with a comprehensive picture of the world ocean with a multi-disciplinary approach that involves the ocean's chemistry, physics, geology, meteorology, and biology. The course includes the following major topics: origins and history of oceanography, Earth structure, plate tectonics, oceanic basins and sediments, chemical and physical characteristic of water, circulation of the oceanic water and the atmosphere, waves, tides, coasts, marine life, pelagic and benthic communities, marine resources, and the use and abuses of the ocean.

This course will help students to understand how the earth system works. It also provides knowledge and credit for the US/CSU systems.
