### **Exams**

There will be two exams, one midterm and one final. Each exam must be taken on the date scheduled—no exceptions.

## **Grading**

Grades are calculated on the following percentages:

#### **Attendance**

Because class discussions and group work are an important part of this course, attendance is mandatory. Up to 3 absences are allowed. After that, you will be dropped.
