# Straight Talk Dating Violence on Campus

#### Know the Facts...

- •Nearly 1 in 3 (29%) college women report having been a victim of an abusive dating relationship in her life.
- •57% of students who report having been in an abusive dating relationship indicate it occurred in college.
- •52% of college women report knowing a friend who has experienced violent and abusive dating behaviors including physical, sexual, digital, verbal or controlling abuse.
- •Further, 58% of students said they would not know how to help if they knew someone was a victim.
- •Between 20 and 25 percent of women in college will be the victim of a completed or attempted rape before they graduate.
- •Men and women age 18 and 19 experience the highest rates of stalking.

## Who We Serve

Jenesse Center was founded more than 30 years ago with the goal of ensuring that families in crisis have options available to them to escape violence and create lives full of hope and possibility. Founded by five African-American women who were survivors of domestic violence, Jenesse Center serves a unique purpose because we primarily serve families of color, a population that has been traditionally underserved or unserved.


During our years of service to the community, Jenesse Center has housed more than 15,000 victims and survivors of domestic violence in our emergency shelters and transitional housing apartment facilities. Through our domestic violence legal clinic, and other outreach and educational programs, we have educated more than 100,000 women, children, young adults and men about the issue of domestic violence. Through media outlets—including capitalizing on the reach of the Internet through our website, <a href="www.jenesse.org">www.jenesse.org</a>, we have been able to reach more than a million people about the issue of domestic violence and its effect on American families.

We have grown from a community and grassroots effort with an operating budget of approximately \$436,000 to a full-service, professional operation with local, state, national and international recognition. Our current operating budget is approximately \$2.7 million.

Our mission is to provide victims of domestic violence with a comprehensive, centralized base of support to assist them in addressing their immediate crisis and towards changing the patterns of abuse in their lives.
