President James M. Limbaugh

Dr. James M. (Jim) Limbaugh has served as the president of West Los Angeles College, a diverse urban dual-purpose college of 9,000 students, since October 2016. During his tenure, the College has been named an Aspen Institute Top 150 institution; established two baccalaureate degree programs (Dental Hygiene and Avionics), developed an associate's degree in Climate Change Studies, and created the California Center for Climate Change Education, prioritizing curricular enhancement, workforce development, and advocacy initiatives, with a focus on social justice. Recently, Dr. Limbaugh was also selected as one of only 25 presidents nationwide to be named an Aspen Institute Presidential Fellow.

Gayatri Seghal: Mindfulness for Selfcare and to Combat Climate Anxiety

Gayatri Sehgal is moved by the wisdom of the non-human world. They facilitate wellness and resilience for activists through Yoga-based philosophy and practices, raise awareness of intersectional climate justice issues, and create advocacy content under the username @bodhisattvism. They are a graduate Yoga Studies candidate and co-founded Haus of Liberation, a co-living safe space for QT/BIPOC and vegan spiritual practitioners based in sovereignty, and non-hierarchy. Gayatri believes that through a decolonial, anti-speciesist lens, and an ecofeminist lens that Yoga can reconnect us with an optimism for the climate emergency rooted in compassion for all sentient beings, including ourselves.

STAR Eco Station

The STAR Eco Station is an environmental science museum, an exotic wildlife rescue center, and a haven for endangered and illegally-trafficked exotic animals confiscated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The STAR Eco Station has grown tremendously since it began in 1997.

Erick, Sr. and Katya Bozzi, and their children, Erick, Jr. and Katiana, founded the STAR Eco Station in Culver City, CA, as a division of STAR, Inc. Working in collaboration with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and other government and environmental organizations, STAR Eco Station provides a last chance for illegal or abandoned at-risk exotic wildlife, as well as environmental education outreach programs in over 40 California school districts.
